

Playing with Asymmetry

Have you ever wondered how to achieve interesting and appealing quilt designs with simple-to-sew blocks? Perhaps you are looking for a quick project or wanting to show a beginner how to make a non-traditional layout?


Think of using blocks with irregular pieces or lop sided colour, such as the block shown here, sometimes known as "Bonnie Scotsman". You can achieve similar results with many other blocks such as Log Cabin or any other off centre block.


The key to success is to try different layout options. We suggest using a design wall when possible, even if it's a flannel sheet tacked to a wall or door. The design wall will give you the opportunity to audition different layout combinations and decide the best choice. It would be very helpful if you can take pictures of each layout and use them for reference later.

Here are the cutting instructions for one Bonnie Scotsman block measuring 8" square (finished measurement):

Light gold	one 4 ¹ /2" square	Light Green	<i>two 2¹/₂" x 4¹/₂" rectangles</i>
Medium gold	one 2½" square	Medium green	<i>two 2¹/₂</i> " <i>x 4¹/₂</i> " <i>rectangles</i>
Dark gold	one 2½" square	Dark green	two 2 ¹ /2" squares

Here are some great layout combinations for 24 blocks with a ¹/₂" and 2" borders:





Try auditioning a variety of layout possibilities the next time you make a set of blocks. You'll be surprised at all the combinations..
